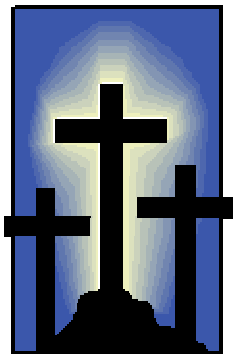

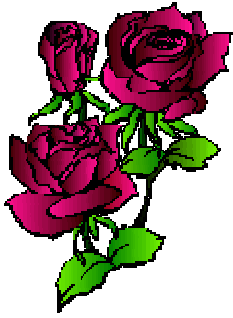

Temple Talk

Given by Richard Harris on 12/27/09

Merry Christmas and good morning. A few weeks ago I was asked to provide a temple talk today.

Pastor Mel gave me some ideas for the talk which I of course rejected immediately and decided to write a talk of my own choosing. Since being asked, I have had a number of ideas which I felt all had merit. So I will try to blend the ideas into one perspective.

When I was in my teens, my family was members of a church near where we lived. I was happy with the church, had many friends there and would probably have continued my relationship with the church until we moved away. There was a situation which occurred that created a very negative political environment and I chose to stop going to church altogether. In my 20's and 30's, I had no contact with any church on a regular basis and was very busy with my businesses. I specifically avoided church even though my siblings were committed to their family church. I had been totally secularized and came to the realization that I probably would never be a churchgoer again. I still continued to believe in Christ and God, I still adopted the Christian ethic that I had learned as a youngster but the concept of becoming a regular member of any church was something that I never expected to regain.

When our daughter Becky was about 10, she began to come to St. Paul's with her friend Katie Binebrink who is Liisa's daughter. They were the best of friends and spent a lot of time together. Eventually, Becky became an associate member of the church and began accepting some of the responsibilities. She was an acolyte many times and attended the services and Sunday School. When Christmas came, she was part of the pageant and we came to St. Paul's to watch the show. Ginny and I enjoyed seeing Becky being a part of St. Paul's but we didn't think that we would ever consider becoming members ourselves.

Then there was an odd occurrence which prompted us to think about St. Paul's in a different light. We had been to a viewing of one of Ginny's former bosses who was also a family friend. At the viewing were 3 ladies who we spoke with and seemed very familiar. We realized that these 3 ladies were members of St. Paul's and were also friends of the family that Ginny had worked with. The 3 ladies were Gene Zepp, Oneida Jones and DJ Seaks who we later realized were inseparable lifelong friends. We began to come to church more frequently and I began to feel that going to St. Paul's was becoming something I looked forward to and that it was a missing part of my life. Shortly after that epiphany, Pastor Mel, who had just started her ministry at St. Paul's, asked us if we would like to have Becky baptized and renew our own Christian faith and become members of St. Paul's. We accepted and happily became members. This was during the period when the church ceiling was being repaired and most of the services were held in the fire hall. This added an additional opportunity to meet with the other members of the church and we found that we genuinely felt welcomed into the congregation. Since then, people have come and gone, but the feeling of openness and Christian geniality has sustained us in times of stress and discord. Even when we disagreed with something that was happening, we knew that all of our St. Paul's extended family were striving to maintain a Christian attitude and outlook.

Eventually, we became more involved with the responsibilities of maintaining different parts of the church. Ginny taught Sunday School and worked on the Bazaar and Lent soup suppers. I became a member of the Church Council and am currently the Church Treasurer. Being the treasurer gives me a unique way of seeing St. Paul's. I can see when things are going well and when there are problems on the horizon. When I accepted the position of treasurer, my predecessor predicted that we would probably be insolvent in a couple of years. As treasurer, it is my job to count the numbers and see the trends of the income and outflows of funds. Since 2003 when I started, the end of the year numbers have been acceptable but rarely encouraging. St. Paul's seems to be capable of supporting itself but not improving to the extent that we have a surplus to carry over into the next year and certainly not enough to create new projects or ministries. To confound me, we have maintained so many projects and ministries that I am amazed that this small country church has such a large footprint in the community. We have built a beautiful playground for all the kids in the community; we have a fantastic Sunday School program that continues to grow and gave us a wonderful Christmas program a couple of weeks ago. We have a very active outreach group that provides gifts for needy people and soldiers at different times of the year. We have a group that provides sandwiches for the hungry within Carroll County once a month all year long. We have a core of very dedicated leaders who try their best to maintain the stewardship of our church building, the business of the church and to prepare for the future of our church. We utilize the church property for the flea markets which provides an outlet for people from all around our region to make unwanted items available for other members of the community who want them. The list goes on and on of the impact that St. Paul's has in our community. There are so many things that people don't even think about

or know about that St. Paul's does. Our church nurtures, heals, educates and entertains. St. Paul's has been an important part of our community as long as I have been coming here and I hope that it will always be an active and compassionate part of the fabric of our region. I hope that all who come to St. Paul's will always be welcomed and encouraged to become a part of our fold. I hope that we will never see a time when St. Paul's no longer exists. We are St. Paul's. Not the building, not the Pastor, not the property. Pastor Mel is our spiritual guide but we, the people, are St. Paul's Lutheran Church. St. Paul's is my family church and I hope it always will be. As long as we continue to be the church we are, I will proudly say that I am a member and I will ask if anyone else would join us. We have much yet to do and many good Christians to help us. We will support the church and the church will support us.
