Halloween has just passed and, with just a nod to Thanksgiving and bypassing Advent altogether, we are being thrown right into Christmas. We are racing to Christmas perhaps because we are looking for the familiar stories of light and love. We are looking for Jesus.

As we gather for Thanksgiving, may we slow down the Christmas rush long enough to remember why we are thankful. I am thankful for all of you. For the time we have had to get to know one another a little bit and for the wonderful service to and love of the Lord I see in you all each time I am with you. I am thankful for my family, friends, and ministry partners (even as I am saddened by the loss of some, I will be forever thankful for them and their gifts of ministry). I am thankful that as we sit down at our tables, we are always given the chance to remember to be and carry that light and hope out to those in the world around us who are in need. The Lord comes to us in those who are hungry and thirsty, those who are homeless and sometimes helpless. I am thankful for the time we have left to make a difference. Most of all, I am thankful most of all for the gift the angels have and will continue to proclaim each Advent and Christmas season, that the Lord of Light and Hope came and dwelt among us and is still with us now.

The voice of the angel in the familiar and beloved account above from Luke calls us back to a time long ago. It is an ancient call to slow down and hear the good news of hope. A call to come and see what God is doing. Advent gives us this time to stop, look, listen, and prepare our hearts for all that God has done for us. Take time for Advent. Hear the promise of new life and then join in the Christmas Eve celebration and worship as we gather to hear, see, and feel that promise unfold in a little town, long ago, as a manger was filled with a babe, the very presence of God with us.







# Carroll Lutheran School Update



This school year marks the 25th year of Carroll Lutheran School! Almost 30 years ago the conversation started amongst a group within the Westminster Conference of Churches (which St Paul's is part of) to open a Christian school within the Conference. Studies were completed and a commitment was made by all churches in the conference to move forward. In Sept 2000, the school opened in classroom space within St Ben's, Westminster, with 38 students in K - 3rd grade. Each year the school continued to grow with students and added grades until they were a

K-8th grade school. Over winter break 2006, the school moved to their own new building just west of Westminster, that building is now 18 years old.

The school has been through challenging times with the economy and enrollment swings, with their highest year of enrollment at 120 students before the economic downturn in the mid 2,000's. Who would have thought that a global pandemic would have helped to resurrect the school with sending students to CLS? During COVID, the school grew from around 60 students to over 110. They have been able to maintain enrollment at just over 100 for this school year.

CLS provides an exceptional education, formed in faith. The central purpose of CLS is to provide a quality education where the love of Christ sets the tone to develop, cultivate, and nurture all aspects of learning, including spiritual, academic, and social. They have provided a proven and accredited academic curriculum supplemented with activities that support and challenge learners. The School's wish is to continue to make CLS education accessible to every child by keeping the tuition within reach, reaching new families to grow and renew the CLS community, and continuing to invest in staff attraction, development, and retention.

Over the years, St Paul's has had several members attend CLS and more recently, we had one member as a middle school teacher. Our own Pastor Mel was a huge supporter of the school, having served on the Board and also remembered the school in her will.

CLS recently held their annual meeting for delegates and pastors in the Conference, each church in the Conference has two delegates. Some sobering numbers were presented to the group. It costs CLS almost \$12,000 per student to meet their operating budget each year. With the school's focus on "mission, not money" after scholarships, financial aid, and the conference church member discount the average family pays just over \$6,000 per student, leaving the remaining expenses to be offset by fundraising and generous donations.

This past year, the school was bequeathed with a sizable donation from the estate of our very own Ruth Bare. That donation helped them greatly to offset their budget, but unfortunately those types of donations cannot be built into a budget. Of the 23 churches in the Conference, a total of \$6,000 was donated to CLS last fiscal year from these 23 churches.

We are the same churches that made a commitment over 25 years ago to support CLS. The CLS Board of Trustees understands that many of the Conference churches are also struggling on our own but are asking us to support the school in any way that we are comfortably able to: monetary one-time donations, pledging yearly donations, attending a fundraiser, promoting the school to families with kids, special Sunday collection, and simply praying for the school.

In June 1997, our son Jacob suffered a near-drowning accident at the age of 16 months. Due to this accident, Jacob is severely brain damaged. He has lost the ability to walk, talk and eat. We were not sure how much he could see. The doctors told us this is the worst they have ever seen. Although I believe they did the best they knew how, they gave us little hope. We brought Jake home and did our best to keep him comfortable. This was a momentous job, as his brain was always sending the wrong messages to his body, making him stiff as a board, and making it very difficult to take care of his daily needs. He had a Baclofen pump surgically inserted in his abdomen which pumped medicine into his spinal nerves to help deaden the messages from his brain. Initially, this helped a lot.

About three years after Jake's accident, we were at a follow-up appointment with the rehabilitation team. They were impressed that his skin looked nice and he didn't have any bedsores. They said I was doing a great job and to take him home. When I left that appointment, I rode home thinking, "This can't be it. There must be more. Someone needs to tell me what to do next to make his life better."

I began researching alternative therapies. I found Hyperbaric Oxygen. We started treatments and Jake became much more calm and alert, and began swallowing. I was able to take him off most of his medications, and we started reducing the medication in his internal

Baclofen pump. We were able to remove the pump in February 2007! I also found a sensory stimulation program out of England called Brain-Net. It consists of an exercise routine that we do with Jake. He smiles a lot now and laughs out loud. He enjoys riddles and rhymes and being read to. He vocalizes more and seems to be speaking to us in his own language. We visited the Amen Clinic in Reston, VA, where we were told a lot of Jake's brain works really well. Jake receives acupuncture and a special massage for scoliosis each week. It seems to be a great combination. We have started laser therapy to accelerate cell growth and tissue repair and his neuro-optometrist is amazed that Jake's vision continues to improve with every visit. He has received IV stem cells in Largo, FL. We are seeing improvement in Jake's vision with tracking, and his swallowing has increased. This April we visited the laser specialists in Texas for intensive therapy and learned more uses for the laser at home.

We have tried many other therapies. The ones that work we continue and the ones that don't we chalk up to life experience. I know that God had a reason to give this boy back to us. This has been a long road and sometimes lonely, but Jake is our miracle. To see how he touches lives is a priceless gift. Without speaking, he can cross barriers and melt hearts. He has come a long way for a boy who "probably would not make it through the night and if he did would be a vegetable." Jake has shown us how fragile life is and how we need to value it. Deep in my heart I know he will get his life back! He is a fighter!

Jake's therapies are very expensive and many are not covered by insurance. Jake has a fund that was started by friends and family when his accident happened. We need your help to continue the therapies that have helped Jake so much.

- Distributed anointing oil to all churches in preparation for healing/anointing services as requested by the Parish Worship and Music Team as churches chose to participate.
- Worship bulletin creating printing and assisting others to do so.
- Put together the Ministerial Rotation August and September.
- Attended to many emails, texts, and phone calls.
- Attended Westminster Conference Planning Meeting.
- Many Staff meetings with Pastor Amanda as we begin to work together and share ministry with the Parish.
   We are reorganizing the visitation of shut-ins and others and will begin getting back up to regular monthly visits going forward.
- Played the part of Chavah, the Barnyard merchant for St. Paul's VBS.
- Concluded the marriage counseling for Matthew Bosley and Lexi Schene, a couple from St. Abrahams. Now working on completing the Wedding Service.
- Many hospital visits, house visits, visits to shut-ins. Hours for pastoral counseling and grief counseling/support. Reaching out to and visitation current members and members who have drifted away.
- IT issues and phone issues continue in several churches and have resolved one of them today. Work is being continued with others to work toward solutions still needed.
- Continuing to support where and when I can do so. Praying constantly for the Lord's direction and blessings for all of us.
